Education Program in Sociology is oriented for students to acquire:

ethical and practical knowledge both in general and specific in the field of sociology;

theoretical knowledge in basics of sociology, key sociological theories and directions;

with knowledge and special training in different spheres of sociology (urban sociology, educational, healthcare and economic sociology, work and organizational sociology).

Education Program in Sociology is oriented for students to develop:

to effectively use in practice the knowledge gained in sociology alongside other necessary skills for working within the sphere;

logical and critical thinking skills;

to understand and stand for human rights, fairness and impartiality, social and democratic values while practically working in the sphere of sociology;

to strive for promotion of universal values and professional ethical standards.

the admission to the program

citizen, holding a state certificate of general education or a similar document, successfully passing the Unified National Exams as well as passing English as a foreign language within the requirements for admission to the Bachelor Education Program in Sociology.

Admission to the program – English as a foreign language.

Enrollment in the Bachelor Education Program in Sociology without the Unified National Exams is possible based on existing legislation.

Enrollment through mobility is available twice per year, based on scheduled periods defined by the Ministry of Education and Science of Georgia and GIPA regulations.

Enrollment in the Bachelor Education Program in Sociology or acceptance of students from accredited foreign educational institution is implementing based on the decision of the ministry of Education and Science of Georgia.

es/Competences:

Understanding:

in-depth knowledge on sociological disciplines and sufficient information on existing theories and ongoing processes; comprehends problematic and complex issues in the sphere of sociology; understands the tasks of sociology as a science; is aware of basic sociological concepts and theoretical approaches alongside empirical findings; understands the sphere's history of formation and development; knows methods in sociology both quantitative and qualitative (types of interview, desk-analysis of documents, review of literature, focus-groups, observation and ethnographic research, diary, experiment and mass enquiry).

Ability:

applies gained knowledge and acquired skills to practice. Even with limited resources, he/she uses adequate and effective strategies to solve practical problems, after receiving relevant consultations; demonstrates basic practice skills, acquired within the program and relevant for sociological research; Under pre-defined instructions, plans and implements a small-scale research, identifies methods and instruments for each problem, processes gained data by means of respective programs and instruments.

independently plans and implements different components of theoretical and empirical projects, follows professional ethical standards at every stage of research: planning, implementation, analysis and reporting.

Knowledge:

identifies and formulates specific problems, singles out their solving ways and gives arguments to given decision; searches and finds information from different sources, processes the data and makes conclusions.

independently analyzes sociological literature; views one and the same issue, phenomenon or concept from different (theoretical and practical) angles, processes more or less complex information by means of synthesis, identifies constituents and further synthesis; formulates own decisions and research results comprehensively and with proper argumentation.

Skills:

expresses his/her own ideas, arguments and conclusions related to different sociological topics and problems both in writing and oral format – both in Georgian and English; communicates with specialists and laypeople, shares information with specialists and laypeople both in mother tongue and foreign language; comprehends and applies sociological terminology in correct way.

effectively uses new communication and information technologies.

expresses his/her discourse in a correct way – both in writing and orally and actively engages in discussions related to sociology.

independently manages the learning process more or less independently, shows the understanding of its peculiarities and demonstrates the potential of professional development. Independently and multilaterally evaluates the learning process and its outcomes, identifies further learning needs; remains permanently engaged in renovation of knowledge with the aim of professional development.

understands and respects universal rights and cultural diversity; respects human rights, acts with social responsibility and has developed civic awareness; recognizes gender and equal opportunities; promotes the establishment of values; rejects racial, ethnic and gender discrimination.

ethical decisions, acts with collegiality and is fully aware of his/her own responsibilities, stands for professional ethical standards when planning or implementing projects; defends freedom of objects based on respective ethical standards; expresses and accepts criticism correctly; respects copyrights and rejects plagiarism.

Learning methods:

electronic resources

one or several methods from above-mentioned or/and any other method in accordance with the objective of a concrete teaching course, defined in the course syllabus.

Assessment for student knowledge:

Assessment component of Bachelor Education Program in Sociology encompasses students' active participation in the teaching process and is based on the principle of continuous assessment of acquired knowledge.

Acquired knowledge on Bachelor Education Program in Sociology is organized in accordance with the Order No. 3 by the Minister of Education and Science of Georgia, January 5th, 2007 "On Higher Education Program Credits".

Assessment component of Bachelor Education Program in Sociology evaluation of student's learning results in each component of the program must include mid-term (Onetime or Multiple) and summative evaluation, which together make up 100 Points).

Summative evaluations (Evaluation forms) include evaluation component/components, what determine ways to assess student's knowledge and/or ability and/or competence (Written tests, homework, practical/theoretical work, etc.). Assessment component unites homogeneous assessment methods (Test, essay, presentation, discussion, performance of theoretical/practical work, participation in discussion, etc.). Assessment method/methods are measured by assessment criteria, by which achievement of learning outcomes is being measured.

Each form and component has certain value allocated from the final score (100 Points), what is indicated in each Syllabus and is being communicated to each student in the beginning of the semester.

Assessment of the achievement of the student's learning results in each component of the program should include mid-term and summative evaluations. Credits shall not be awarded by using only mid-term or summative evaluation).

In the assessment system, there are five types of positive evaluation:

-100 points of evaluation;
1-90 points of evaluation;
points of evaluation;
61-70 points of evaluation;
-60 points of evaluation.

negative evaluation:

– 41-50 out of the maximum evaluation, which means that the student needs to work more to pass the examination and he/she shall be given the possibility to retake the examination.

50 or less out of the maximum evaluation, which means that the work done by the student is not enough and he/she has to retake the course.

In case of taking 0-40 points of evaluation in any component of the educational program, the University must hold an additional examination within not later than 5 days after the announcement of the results of the summative evaluation. This obligation shall not apply to the dissertation, Master's project/thesis or other scientific project/paper. The points, awarded to the student in the summative evaluation, shall not be included in the final evaluation of the student at the additional examination. The evaluation obtained by the student at the additional examination is the summative evaluation and shall be included in the final evaluation of the student at the end of the educational program. In case of taking 0-50 points in the final evaluation, including the evaluation obtained at the additional examination, the student evaluation will be F-0 points.

The Grade Point Average (GPA) is part of the system of evaluation of the student's knowledge. The student's Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated by multiplying the evaluation of each subject of the educational program, to the credits of that subject. The product of multiplication of the subjects and credits is summed up and divided by the total number of the credits of the educational program. The weight of the point in the calculation of the average number is:

ent:

The Bachelor Education Program in Sociology will be employed both in the public and non-governmental sectors (those positions where BA qualification is required) The program provides students with practical experience that gives opportunity to graduates to start professional development in the field of Sociology.

continuing education process:

The Bachelor Education Program in Sociology are authorized to continue studies at Georgian or other countries' higher institutions at any MA programs if preconditions for the specific bachelor qualifications.

Human resources necessary for the program implementation:

Human resources are being involved in the implementation Education Program in Sociology. Courses from the educational program are being led by academic personnel of the University, as well as by personnel with sufficient experience and competence.

Information about human resources is available in Annex N2.

Material resources necessary for the program implementation:

Infrastructure and material-technical resources are fully available for students to reach the learning outcomes included in this and that program:

Computer labs, lecture halls, seminar rooms, and conference halls equipped with appropriate inventory; computer equipment, equipped with computer hardware and informational-communicational technologies; computer classrooms, computer hardware connected to internet and internal network and adequate computer software in learning/teaching process; modern technical equipment et cetera. Video equipment, software and hardware support necessary to implement the program.

The program is provided with appropriate manual and methodical literature. The University's library provides students with electronic textbooks relevant to the syllabus, educational materials, as well as the library's database.

The University, which is owned and possessed by the University, ensures the Digital Media and Communication bachelor program to implement its objectives and achieve planned learning outcomes.

Structures - Educational bachelor program is carried out in the buildings and structures owned and leased by the university, where sanitary-hygienic and safety norms are highly respected (the building has installed alarms, fire extinguishers, video control system takes place on the perimeter, order is maintained by the custodial servant of the university). The building is in full accordance with the requirements established for the institutions, lecturing and practicum auditoriums are equipped with relevant technique and inventory (projector, chairs, desks, boards et cetera).

The library of the University the relevant printed and electronic fund of the bachelor's educational program is preserved, which is available for the students, invited and academic personnel. The library provides the opportunity to use internet and international electronic resources (EBSCO; JSTOR; Cambridge Journals Online; BioOne Complete; e-Duke Journals Scholarly Collection; Edward Elgar Publishing e-books; IMechE Journals; New England Journal of Medicine; Open edition Journals; Royal Society Journals Collection; SAGE Premier). Academic Personnel - The working space of academic personnel is equipped with the relevant inventory and technical equipment (chairs, tables, wardrobes, computers with the access to internet, fax machine).

Communication technologies - The University uses information and communication technologies in order to facilitate the implementation and administration of bachelor's educational program in Communication. There is a corresponding software for the bachelor's educational program in Communication, the existing computer hardware meets the contemporary requirements. The system is available for students, academic, invited and administration personnel. Electronic system – lmb.gipa.ge – is used for assessing student's knowledge and to coordinate teaching process. The system with access to assessments, facilitates the control of academic attendance of students and the learning process in general. Through the web-page, which contains information about the learning process, the University provides publicity and accessibility of information.
